Curriculum Areas

KS1 History

Pupils should be taught about significant historical events, people and places in their own locality

Previous Knowledge

- Some knowledge of the ways modern transport differs from transport 200 years ago (wind and muscle power instead of engines, natural materials instead of man-made materials)
- Some knowledge of simple ways to shape and join materials (using scissors and glue)







Activity

- Talk about different ways we travel now
- Show the historic images of ships and discuss how they differ from ships today
- Show the images of an Oak tree and the Fairlop Oak
- Explain to pupils that they are going to hear a story about how the fair began near to a very special Oak tree at Fairlop
- Read the Daniel Day's Story
- Show and discuss the image of the Fairlop Frigate
- Ask pupils to use recycled material to design a carriage in which they and their friends could travel to Fairlop Fair

Follow-up Activities

- Think about other materials in the classroom and identify things made of wood
- Discuss why it is important to recycle materials
- Design a poster to encourage people to recycle their waste
